

## SUSTAINABILITY IS


- An interdisciplinary problem, requiring voices from many disciplines to come together in a systems thinking process

## SUSTAINABILITY MINOR


- 6 courses or 18 credits

- 4 additional courses from any department
- Recommended: a selection of studio, LA, HART courses to integrate theory and practice
- Double dip credits: you can use the courses to count for both your gen ed MassArt requirements as well as the Sustainability Minor requirements
- Currently about 40-60 students




